End of the Line for the Cent

When I was a boy, the Old Man would leave his daily pocket change on the kitchen counter top. This numismatic assembly typically also included his University of Dayton class ring and a pocket piece Morgan dollar. Neither of those things attracted my attention, nor did the clad quarters, nickels, and dimes. The reddish brown Lincoln Cents, however, did not go unnoticed. Being that they were different in color made them easy to pick out but I was more interested in the man featured on the obverse of those coins: Abraham Lincoln. Around this same time, we took a family trip to Hodgenville to see

Mr. Lincoln's birth site and log cabin. I vaguely remember going but the book about American Presidents my parents bought for my brother and myself helped to keep this core memory fresh for years to come. In my young mind, I thought it was really neat that there was a president from



Kentucky and that he was important enough to be on a coin. So this led to me steal a few circulated pennies from my dad (Sorry, dad). I have gone on to assemble a collection of Lincoln cents (honestly) and it is with a twinge of sorrow that we are at end of circulating cents in the United States. It makes sense economically to cease production of these coins due to their manufacturing and materials costs that have been well published for years. This is indisputable but my heart still hurts. This does close a chapter in numismatic history as the US cent is one of the most collected coin types

ever. Cents have been an entry point for coin collectors so one wonders how will little boys or girls get introduced to collecting cheap and readily available coins to start their journey into this hobby? Only time will tell.

Radiohead Coin Hunt

Club member Lincoln Pippen wanted to share that the band Radiohead's lead vocalist Thom Yorke mysteriously announced on May 16th that 400 unique and numbered coins were hidden around the world. This announcement appears to be linked to a new album by Yorke and musician Mark Pritchard entitled *Tall Tales*. A YouTube video is posted that shows how these coins were forged and minted. Some coins have been left out in the wild to be found while others have been included in deluxe vinyl album editions. As of the evening of June 8th, 117 coins out of 400 have been discovered and reported. What a cool crossover that mixes music, numismatics, and the thrill of the hunt.
